Detroit, MI (July 13, 2017) – The James Pearson Duffy Department of Art & Art History is pleased to present its *Annual Great Lakes Regional Community College Art Exhibition*, July 21 through August 18, 2017. The opening reception will be held on Friday, July 21, 5-8PM, with an awards presentation at 6PM.

The exhibition will feature artworks created by students and instructors from the following community colleges: Glen Oaks Community College, Mott Community College, North Central Michigan College, and Schoolcraft College.

Wayne State University (WSU) scholarship awards will be given to students for their outstanding artworks in the exhibition, including the following: \$5,000 Best of Show WSU Scholarship Award; \$4,000 First Place WSU Scholarship Award; \$3,000 Second Place WSU Scholarship Award; and several \$2,000 Honorable Mention WSU Scholarship Awards.

This event is free and open to the general public. The Art Department Gallery is located in the Art Building on the campus of Wayne State University, near the intersection of Cass Avenue and Kirby Street.
